Light and dark, animals and fish, plants and people all pleased the God of the universe as the work of his hands. God took a week to lay out the foundation of the world. Then he placed his stamp of approval on every part.

6. Genesis 11:1-32

Noah's descendants believed their accomplishments would make them famous. They would make the tallest of towers. Instead of glorifying and worshiping the God who had created everything, including the tallest of mountains and even their own ingenuity, they were honoring the work of their hands and ultimately themselves. By confusing them with different languages, God reminded them who was in control and who could give meaning to their lives.

7. Genesis 12:1-20

Abram nobly followed God, leaving his homeland and trusting God each step of the way. That was until he got to Egypt. Fearing for his own survival, Abram stopped trusting in God and started developing schemes to protect himself. His plan was to lie to his neighbors. At the time, Abram thought lying was the only way to save his family. Abram and Sarai both suffered the consequences of his lack of faith.

8. Genesis 13:1 - 14:24

Abram and Lot discovered that there was not enough land for the two of them. Their herds, their families, and their men could not survive together. Disagreements, arguments, and quarrels were constantly occurring between the two families. Abram honored his relationship with Lot above his own welfare. He gave Lot the choice of the best of the land. By putting relationships above self-interest, Abram avoided conflict with Lot.

9. Genesis 15:1 – 17:27

God had promised Abram and Sarai a child, but they were uncertain how he would accomplish it. They were very old, beyond the years of childbearing. So Abram and Sarai took matters into their own hands, instead of trusting God's timing. Genuinely trusting God means waiting to see how he will accomplish his promises.

10. Genesis 18:1 – 20:18

Lot and his family lived in a sinful city, Sodom. They had lived in the city for so long that they had become used to the rampant sin in that place. In fact, it was difficult for them to leave the city even when they knew God was going to destroy it. Constant exposure to the sinful ways of those people had desensitized them to how despicable sin really is.

Why would God give Abraham a son and then order him to be killed? But Abraham obeyed. In the end, God provided Abraham with an offering, and Isaac went home with his father. Abraham had passed God's test. He had found the strength to trust and obey God.

God answered his prayer and led Abraham's servant to Rebekah. It was not his inquiry to Rebekah, but his inquiry to God, that made all the difference.

14. Genesis 26:1-35

Isaac feared for his life. Instead of trusting God to keep him safe, he chose to lie to the Philistine king. His father, Abraham, had made a similar mistake when he visited Egypt. Isaac should have learned from his father's mistake. He should have taken his problem to God and trusted the Almighty to keep his family safe. Instead, Isaac ended up suffering the consequences of his tragic decision.

Lies and deception were her plan, but not God's plan. Because she rationalized wrongdoing away, she ran the risk of losing both her sons.

17. Genesis 31:1 – 36:43

Jacob's family was full of broken relationships. He fled from his brother to find his in-laws, and he fled from his in-laws to confront his brother. For Jacob, finding forgiveness was the first step in reconciling broken relationships.

By giving in to sexual temptation, Judah not only sinned against God but also created a legacy of familial troubles.
