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Notes

1. Deuteronomy 1:1-46

Forty years after the Hebrews left Egypt, they stood at the edge of the Promised Land to regroup with their leader. Moses reminded them of the times when they had remembered to walk with God and the times they had not. He reminded them of the tragic consequences of not walking with God—forty long years of wandering in the wilderness.

- 6. How did the Israelites grumble against the Lord? (1:26-28)

2. Deuteronomy 2:1-37

Israel was about to enter new territory. God gave them specific instructions about how to proceed and respond as they traveled through this strange land. As long as they followed the Lord's directions, their journey went well and the victory was theirs.

1. What does it feel like when you are lost and there is no one to give you directions?

- 2. What new direction did the Israelites take? (2:1)
- 3. What did the Lord say about passing through the new territory? (2:2-6)

- 6. How did the Lord direct the Israelites into battle? (2:31-33)

3. Deuteronomy 3:1-29

The Israelites fought Og of Bashan, and God gave them the victory. The Lord told Moses not to be afraid, and Moses faced his battles with confidence. When Moses fought the battles God told him to, when God told him to, the way God told him to, Israel experienced victory after victory.

4. Deuteronomy 4:1-43

Moses gave the people the word of God, the direction of God, and the laws of God. He led them by sharing with them what God had said. He encouraged them by telling them who God was. He honored and obeyed God. In the process, he showed the people of Israel how to honor God with their lives.

1. How do you benefit when other people obey the laws of our country?

5. Deuteronomy 4:44 – 5:33

Moses reminded the people that God had faced them at Mount Sinai and had given them guidelines for their lives. He had demanded to be the one and only God of his people. How they treated each other and outsiders was one of the first tests of whether they had taken his commands to heart.

6. Deuteronomy 6:1-25

It was the responsibility of Hebrew parents to teach their children the history of God's provision for them. Teaching their children about God was to be a way of life—when they sat at home and when they walked on the roads. They were to pass along the stories of God and his miraculous deeds to their children and grandchildren. These were reminders that God would certainly provide for them.

7. Deuteronomy 7:1-26

There was an inherent danger for the Israelites in conquering the Promised Land. The Israelites might be tempted to adopt the gods of those cities and people they were subduing. God consistently reminded the Hebrews that their greatest danger was in forsaking him for the false gods around them.

8. Deuteronomy 8:1 – 9:6

"Remember the Lord," Moses told the people. God had brought them so far from their menial jobs in Egypt to the border of the Promised Land. Moses warned them to remember God when they experienced the prosperity that God would inevitably provide. Forgetting to thank and praise their God and Savior could lead to their tragic downfall.

9. Deuteronomy 9:7-29

Moses reminded the Hebrews of how often they had angered God and tested his patience. The Hebrews had been rebellious, obstinate, and stubborn in their disobedience. It was only because of God's mercy that they survived his wrath.

10. Deuteronomy 10:1-22

The Hebrews often did not listen to God. The Lord God told them and told them, but each time he had to tell them again. Through the second set of stone tablets, God gave the Israelites another opportunity to listen and obey.

OPEN

11. Deuteronomy 11:1-32

God reminded the Hebrews of the responsibility of remembering. As they prepared to settle into their new lives, he encouraged them to store his words in their hearts and minds and then to teach them to future generations. Remembering God and the mercy he had shown Israel in the past was important because it would encourage future generations to remain loyal to God.

12. Deuteronomy 12:1-32

Moses shared with the Israelites what kind of worship pleased God. He told them not to worship as individuals, but to worship together as a corporate body. He exhorted the Israelites to follow God's directions for worship, without adding to them or taking away from them.

1. Why is it important to read the owner's manual when you buy a new car?

- 2. What did God command Israel to do to all the altars of worship? (12:1-3)
- 3. What was Israel told about worshiping the Lord? (12:4)

- 6. What clear direction were the people given concerning eating meat? (12:20-25)

13. Deuteronomy 13:1-18

God demanded the truth. He did not take false prophets lightly or the punishment they deserved. He demanded that his people worship him in sincerity as the one true God, no matter what enticements were offered by the false prophets around them.

14. Deuteronomy 14:1-29

God gave specific commands. He covered every detail when it came to describing the best way for the Israelites to eat and live. He wanted them to be pure people of God. He expected his people to obey him all the time in the precise ways he commanded. True love for him as their God would manifest itself in obedience.

15. Deuteronomy 15:1-23

God outlined a practical plan for the nation of Israel to show mercy, compassion, generosity, and forgiveness. He told his people to give freely and to care for the poor. He told his people to be kind to their slaves because the Israelites themselves were once poor slaves, who had experienced God's great kindness.

<u>OPEN</u>

1. What is it like to lend someone money and not get paid back?

- 2. What were the Israelites told to do at the end of every seven years? (15:1)
- 3. How were canceled debts supposed to be handled? (15:2)

16. Deuteronomy 16:1-20

Feasts were for celebrating God's presence and power, his accomplishments and miracles. God reminded the Hebrews to celebrate his gifts just as faithfully as they worshiped and obeyed him. God wanted his people to set aside time to express their joy and gratitude over his abundant provision for them.

<u>OPEN</u>

1. What celebrations does your family celebrate every year?

- 2. What was Israel told to celebrate? (16:1)
- 3. Where were the people of Israel allowed to celebrate the Passover? (16:5-6)
- 4. When were the Israelites told to celebrate the Feast of Weeks? (16:9-11)

- 6. What is the purpose of celebrating the Lord?
- 7. What are different ways people choose to celebrate the Lord?

17. Deuteronomy 16:21 – 17:20

God was intent on the Israelites treating each other with fairness and justice. He set up a network of judges and priests to insure justice was executed in every case. He required respect for the decisions these appointees made. How his people treated each other was an important matter to God.

1. What is the most outrageous legal case you have ever heard about?

- 2. What kind of sacrifice is detestable to the Lord? (17:1)
- 3. What was to be done if someone was suspected of worshiping other gods? (17:2-4)

- 6. How were the Israelites required to act according to the judges' decisions? (17:10-11)

18. Deuteronomy 18:1-22

God wanted his people to stay away from the occult and other deceptive religious practices. He despised these practices because they robbed him of his glory. Only he could control the future or give the Israelites advice on how they should live. Consulting the dead or practicing divination would distract the Israelites from the source for wisdom and truth—God himself.

<u>OPEN</u>

- 1. What kinds of occult practices seem most bizarre to you?
- 2. What do you think draws people to the occult?

- 3. What was Israel told not to imitate when they entered the new land? (18:9)
- 4. Who was not allowed to participate in occult practices? (18:10-11)

- 7. For whom does a fortune-teller speak?
- 8. How are people naive about consulting horoscopes, fortune-tellers, and other "innocent" occult practices?

10. Who is someone involved in the occult for whom you can pray this week?

19. Deuteronomy 19:1 – 20:30

The Israelites faced opposition of all kinds—from outside the camp and from within. God gave them the strength to deal with their opposition from neighboring peoples and the wisdom to deal with each other. It was their complete obedience that gained them access to his strength and wisdom.

<u>OPEN</u>

1. If your city were attacked by another country, to where would you flee?

EXPLORE

- 2. How was a man who hated his neighbor to be punished? (19:11-13)
- 3. How were malicious witnesses dealt with? (19:15-21)
- 4. When Israel went to battle, what were they commanded to do? (20:1)
- 5. What was the priest to say to the Israelite army? (20:2-4)
- 6. How was Israel supposed to conquer the cities that the Lord gave to them? (20:16-18)

20. Deuteronomy 21:1 – 22:30

God gave the Israelites specific laws protecting family relationships. He reminded them over and over again to guard their families from wickedness, jealousies, and disputes. Each family member was expected to exert a positive influence on the family—and by extension, the community. The entire community was to be pure before God. Every family was responsible for maintaining that purity.

- 3. How were the rights of the firstborn to be handled? (21:15-17)

- 6. How do God's laws reveal his desire to protect families?
- 7. How can sexual immorality destroy families?
- 8. What are different ways people handle rebellious children today?

21. Deuteronomy 23:1 – 25:19

God wanted the Israelites to treat each other well while punishing evil swiftly and decisively. He gave them rules and guidelines for loving each other. He defined family not just as immediate family members, but as the extended family of the people of Israel.

1. What rules did you have growing up in your family?

22. Deuteronomy 26:1-19

The Hebrews were to work the land that they were given. They were to feed their families with the profits from their work. Some of their first harvest, though, belonged to the Lord. They gave the first and best of their resources to God in order to acknowledge that he was their Provider. He had provided them with all kinds of good gifts. For this reason, he deserved their praise.

23. Deuteronomy 27:1 -28:68

God was extremely clear with the people of Israel. They had one decision to make: to obey him or not to obey him. God outlined for them the consequences of each decision and pleaded with them to obey him so that they might enjoy his blessings. Although he was a compassionate God, his punishment would be swift and sure.

24. Deuteronomy 29:1 - 30:20

God made an agreement with the Hebrews in Moab much like the agreement made at Mount Sinai. God told them the way they should live. First of all, they should not put any other god before him—the one, true God. He reminded them of their past failures and outlined concrete ways they could determine to follow him.

25. Deuteronomy 31:1-29

Moses knew who his replacement would be. He had spent years training Joshua in the necessary leadership qualities. Moses passed on his authority to Joshua with a promise of God's presence. In addition, God himself exhorted Joshua to be brave and strong for he would be with Joshua.

26. Deuteronomy 31:30 - 32:52

Moses gave a song to the Israelites to encourage them to follow God and to remind them of God's goodness. It was time for Israel to go on without Moses. This song was Moses' last attempt to encourage them to follow God wholeheartedly.
